1. C.A.R.T. volunteer orientation
A two and a half hour introductory training
2. National Incident Management System (NIMS) and Incident Command System Training available online at www.fema.gov
3. Courses through FEMA to include:
 - IS-100.— Introduction to Incident Command
 - IS-700.b—Introduction to the National Incident Management System
4. Participation in emergency exercises and drills to prepare for a real disaster.

8 Key Personal Preparedness Steps

1. Planning: Create a family plan for people, livestock and pets.
2. Preparation: Involve all family members in practicing your plan. Gather all necessary supplies you will need during an emergency. Create prioritized lists of needed actions.
3. Communication: Families should agree on a place to meet and an out of the area contact through which to communicate, if they are separated.
4. Identification: Provide individual identification for pets and all livestock (tags, microchips, photos, etc.) Store photos and copies of brand and registration papers away from home.
5. Transportation: If possible, teach all livestock to load quickly and safely. Have airline kennels for small livestock (chickens, rabbits, etc.), halters, and other necessary supplies ready.
6. Cooperation: Work with friends and neighbors to help ensure timely evacuation and other emergency care for all animals during a crisis.
7. Involvement: Become involved with your Community Animal Response Team or other voluntary emergency organizations in your community.
8. Procedures: Be sure to follow emergency evacuation procedures as set by law enforcement.
